Netball Code of Conduct What Should I Expect as a Teen Involved in Netball?

In Netball we want Children and Young People to feel safe, included, encouraged and supported – essentially, to enjoy themselves so that they keep participating. To make sure that we create this environment, <u>Netball Australia Safeguarding Children & Young People Policy requires</u> everyone involved in Netball to abide by certain behavioural standards when it comes to dealing with Children & Young People.

This is what you can expect when participating in netball

The primary aim of the Code is to protect and safeguard Children and Young People. This Code is to be followed at all times by all Members and all people involved in any way with Netball.

Positive Guidance

You should expect to be treated fairly and respectfully. It is not okay to be treated in a manner that is degrading, cruel, frightening or humiliating.

Language & Tone of Voice

Adults should boost your confidence and encourage you. It is never okay for them to be discriminatory, racist, sexist, belittling, negative, threatening, frightening or sexual

Gift Giving

You should not be receiving gifts from people in positions of responsibility unless parents/carers or other responsible adults have been made aware of any gift given.

Adhering to Role Boundaries

Persons in Positions of Responsibility and Authority must not engage in activities d or seek contact with you outside of usual netball programs, events or activities.

Supervision

You should never be unsupervised, and adults will ensure you are in a safe environment and protected from external threats.

Photography

You have the right not to be photographed and it should only be done so with yours and a parent or carers permission. It should also be done in the presence of other adults.

Working with Children Check

You can expect people like your coaches and others who are in Positions of Responsibility and Authority will have a Working with Children Check.

Use of Electronic Communications

Any communication directly to you should be associated with delivering a netball activity or program, such as advising training is cancelled. Where possible a parent or carer should also be included.

Physical Contact

Any physical contact must be appropriate to the delivery of a Netball activity, such as when appropriately correcting technique. No contact should be initiated if it is against your wishes



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Sexual Misconduct & Relationships

Under no circumstances is any form of 'sexual behaviour' to occur between, with, or in the presence of, Children or Young People in a netball environment.

Over Night Stays

Overnight stays need to be authorised by a Senior Netball Person and your parents/carers. It is your right to contact parents/carers, or others, if you feel unsafe, uncomfortable or distressed during the stay.

Change Room Arrangements

People in positions of authority are required to supervise Children and Young People in change rooms but you do have a right to privacy.

Use, possession or supply of alcohol or drugs

While on duty or carrying out their roles, no person should use, possess or be under the influence of an illegal drug or alcohol. supplying alcohol or drugs (including tobacco) is strictly prohibited.

Transporting Young People

You should only be transported by Persons in Positions of Responsibility with prior authorisation from a Senior Person and/or (where practical to do so) from your parent/carer.
