


Acknowledgement of Country

The vision for our Innovate RAP is to continue our organisation's journey of changing intentions into actions; to break down barriers and ensure equal opportunities are open to First Nations and non-First Nations participants in our sport.



Our Artist

Bayley Mifsud, Merindah-Gunya

Bayley Mifsud is a contemporary Aboriginal artist born in the country town of Warrnambool, located in south-west Victoria. She takes great pride in her heritage as a descendant of the Peek and Kirrae Whurrong clans.

Her Aboriginal name is Merindah-Gunya meaning "Beautiful Spirit" in Peek Whurrong language, which was gifted to her through a naming ceremony on Country at the age of 16, supported by her Elders and community.

Bayley began doing Aboriginal art at a very young age. She was first introduced to the traditional symbols at the age of five, while working on her family's possum skin cloak at the Brambuk Aboriginal Cultural Centre in the Grampians. Her family would often go there on weekends, immersing themselves in culture through art, music, and dance.

Bayley now lives on Wurundjeri Country in Naarm (Melbourne) and has lived a large portion of her life there. Bayley always had a particular passion and talent for art, continuing her artistic pursuits all the way through to VCE. In Year 12, she took on three folio subjects despite being advised against it due to the workload.

At the beginning of COVID in 2020, Bayley found herself with a lot of free time and took the opportunity to start doing art again. She had a large blank wall above her bed and created a series of three pieces telling a story about her family. After sharing an image of her work on her private Facebook page, she received a lot of positive feedback from family and friends. This led to a few close friends reaching out to her to create pieces for their homes.

Since then, her business has grown and she has been a full time artist for just over a year now.

Bayley has a passion for community development, diversity and self-determination as well as continuing the gift of storytelling through her artwork.



Our Artwork

Bayley's artwork tells a story about Netball Victoria, and the connection that the organisation has with its community and Country.

The centralised meeting place is symbolic of Netball Victoria, shown with people surrounding in different sizes and colours to symbolise diversity.

The Journey lines on the bottom right of the piece show the future, past and present journeys of Reconciliation within the organisation.

The water in the bottom left and top right represent the waterways throughout Victoria – all significant to the stories of the Traditional Owners.

Animals throughout also show the connection to Country. In the top right corner there are stars, showing our Elders before us who are now in Dreamtime.

The large meeting places shown throughout the background symbolise the different locations where netball is played throughout the state.

Lastly, the woman by the water is symbolic of the Traditional stories and also the woman who runs this organisation.



Our Business

Netball Victoria holds a unique position within the Victorian sporting landscape, encompassing a diverse range of functions and serving as the guiding force behind the popular sport of netball. Our core business revolves around fostering a lifelong passion for netball, a sport deeply ingrained in the hearts of Victorians. Our mission is underpinned by four strategic pillars: play, grow, inspire, and lead. These pillars fuel collaboration and connectivity across our organisation and community.


Our presence extends from metropolitan hubs to regional outposts, encompassing a network of nine offices. These offices, located in Ballarat, Bairnsdale, Bendigo, Cranbourne, Geelong, Melbourne, Shepparton, Traralgon, and Wodonga, serve as vital touchpoints that enable us to connect with our vast, vibrant community.

We employ a dedicated team of 69 individuals, comprising both full-time and part-time staff members, who work tirelessly to support our 115,000+ members across the state. Our organisation is proud to have two members of our team who identify as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander.

Internally, our reach extends to staff, participants, and to our elite Melbourne Vixens athletes who represent us at the national level. Our influence also extends beyond the workplace as we engage with various organisations, including partners such as RACV and WorkSafe Victoria, alongside stakeholders such as Sport and Recreation Victoria and cooperatives within our community.


Our **sphere of influence** also encompasses the broader Victorian netball community, including our dedicated affiliates, players, umpires, officials, administrators and volunteers. We also resonate with society at large, connecting with ardent sports enthusiasts, schools, and diverse community groups.

With over a century of history, Netball Victoria continues to promote and develop the sport of netball across the state. Our commitment to our core mission and values ensures that we remain a driving force in fostering a lifelong love for netball, inspiring individuals, and empowering communities.



Our RAP

Netball Victoria's Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) signifies our commitment to fostering reconciliation by translating intent into action. Through our Innovate RAP, we seek to focus on creating equal opportunities, recognition, and inclusivity, affirming our commitment to breaking biases and creating a welcoming environment for all.



Our RAP is Championed by Andrea Pearman, Netball Victoria's Chief Executive Officer who leads by example, keeping the Organisation and Working Group accountable at all times.

Where we have come from

Amid the challenges posed by the COVID pandemic, we formed a dedicated RAP Working Group and created a full-time First Nations netball coordinator role. This dedicated staff member will continue to oversee and maintain the consistency of our reconciliation initiatives.

Through the establishment of our First Nations Pathway Working Group, we identified the low number of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander athletes coming through the Netball Victoria pathways programs and sought to address this lack of representation.

Now known as the First Nations Advisory Group, it includes four Netball Victoria staff members and eight external First Nations ambassadors, each bringing their experiences within netball as First Nations people to our meetings and advising how we can actively work to increase First Nations participation and ensure we are providing culturally safe spaces for athletes. Our efforts have strengthened relationships with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities, including with organisations such as VACSAL and VAHS whose events we support and promote, and with individuals in community through our Advisory Group, RAP Working Group, artists and pathway athletes. We have continued to work with, listen to and build on our current and new relationships, to allow greater understanding and awareness for us as an organisation.

Education and training continue to play a pivotal role as we continue our reconciliation journey. A 12-month training plan to grow social and cultural awareness in our staff and affiliate communities is in place to ensure that everyone engaged in Victorian netball, from grassroots to elite levels, respects and understands the importance of inclusivity, cultural safety, creating opportunities for those facing barriers and the shared pursuit of reconciliation.

Our RAP

Where we are going

We are committed to creating greater opportunities through First Nations clinics and programs, and delivering workshops for umpires and coaches that will foster opportunities for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people to participate in netball.

Through building social and cultural awareness, we recognise past and present challenges facing First Nations people and reaffirm our commitment to supporting First Nations people to participate in netball in a culturally safe way. Our organisation's Acknowledgement of Country reflects our recognition of the contribution that First Nations people make to sport, and in particular to netball, in Victoria.

Delivering education and training in the workplace and to our affiliate community will help to ensure we are demonstrating and promoting a culturally diverse and safe workplace, where all identities are respected and welcomed.

We seek to build on existing initiatives such as having Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander flags on display, the permanent artwork piece on our Melbourne Vixens' home and away dresses, and sharing of stories that celebrate First Nations communities in netball, to continue translating intentions into actions and forging deeper connections with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities.

Netball Victoria First Nations Clinics

Netball Victoria is dedicated to running four First Nations clinics throughout the year in various locations around the state, connecting with community groups, associations and clubs. This Netball Victoria initiative is supported by RACV.

At our Albury/Wodonga NAIDOC Week clinic, Adrian (father of Lexi and Eli) highlighted the significance of these clinics in providing his children with opportunities that he didn't have growing up in Central Australia. "It's important for our community to participate in sport to keep healthy," he said. "I want my kids to stay in sport and keep that going for the next generation."

Victorian Aboriginal Community Services Association Ltd (VACSAL)

Netball Victoria attends and supports VACSAL's annual junior and senior netball tournaments held regionally throughout Victoria, providing administration support to deliver the competitions.

Worawa Aboriginal College

Netball Victoria attends the school's annual Reconciliation Carnival, promoting the pathway for First Nations netballers in Victoria.

Clubs & Teams

Netball Victoria supports independent and affiliated First Nations clubs and teams to assist with the growth of the sport in First Nations communities.

Rumbalara, an Aboriginal community-run sporting club in the Murray Goulburn area on Yorta Yorta, is one example of a club Netball Victoria supports coaching and umpiring opportunities.

In partnership with Netball Australia, Visit Victoria and Coaching Unlimited a development coaching course was delivered to coaches from Rumbalara to further develop opportunites for First Nations coaches.


Since 2018, the Melbourne Vixens have celebrated and acknowledged the contribution Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people have made to society through Suncorp Super Netball's First Nations Round (initially named Indigenous Round).

Each year the Melbourne Vixens engage with a local Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander artist to create a playing dress for the round that symbolises the Victorian First Nations netball community.

In recent years we have also created replica warm up tops displaying the playing dress design, as well as other items featuring the design, to be sold as merchandise. All profits made from these items are used to support our First Nations pathway programs. Since 2022, we have held online auctions for our Melbourne Vixens athletes' signed and worn First Nations warm up tops and dresses, which also supports First Nations netballers with all proceeds supporting the pathway programs.

Aside from highlighting local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists, our First Nations Round supports more than our netball community. We aim to celebrate First Nations culture, history, entertainment and players creating opportunities and visibility for all First Nations people.

We recognise the immense contribution that First Nations people continue to make to the sport of netball and want to highlight the power of the annual First Nations Round for our netball community.

2021 Dress

Round 10 | Vixens vs Swifts | Wurundjeri Land

The Melbourne Vixens' 2021 Indigenous Round dress artwork was designed by Tammy-Lee Atkinson, a proud Yorta Yorta woman from Mooroopna.

The overarching theme of the artwork resembles the Victorian netball community returning to the court in 2021, and the Vixens returning to Victoria for the Suncorp Super Netball season.

The waterways are connecting lakes, rivers or the ocean – and represent the connection of sport, family and coming together. These waterways meet at each of the four team values of the Melbourne Vixens. Women can be seen around each value, representing the gathering of the team, coaches and support staff.

Linework is the traditional form of artwork for Tammy and can be seen at the bottom of the dress, representing the land that the Vixens play on. The three circles on the side panels represent the rivers that connect to Echuca, where Tammy was born – the Campaspe River, Goulburn River and Murray River. These rivers also represent her siblings – three were

born in Echuca, three in Kerang and three in Shepparton.

Tammy started her career with Kaiela Arts in Shepparton where she also delivers programs including for youth, women, and children.

"My art has been connecting with both Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal communities and I love the fact that I have been able to design the dress for the Melbourne Vixens, to me it has been an honour," she said.

"To have Indigenous Round for sport in general is amazing and is a great opportunity to highlight Indigenous people. It's amazing for netballers in Victoria to see and connect with the dress and highlight culture."

Round 12 | Vixens vs Lightning | Wurundjeri Land Round 13 | Thunderbirds vs Vixens | Kaurna Land

The Melbourne Vixens' 2022 First Nations dress was designed by Bri Pengarte Apma Hayes, proud Arrernte woman and young emerging artist. Bri's family is from Arrernte country in Alice Springs, and their culture is reflected in her style of art.

Each dot tells a story and has significance as it can all represent the journey of a person. The dots form a circle with many layers, representing the unity of everyone coming together – the Vixens players, coaches, staff, and community.

The U symbol represents people and how individuals may walk a similar journey or go through similar things in life and show resilience. The blue lines and cross hatching represent one's journey, the flow of life and our constant process of learning.

The design incorporates the symbols, dots, and lines to tell a story and to represent togetherness, fearlessness, and resilience.

"When people work together it shows fearlessness, because there is always strength in numbers. I think unity is a great thing to show in my artwork, especially with the reconciliation journey we are currently going through," Bri said. "I really wanted to show the best way to represent the themes and individuals who work among the Melbourne Vixens as well as my own community."

Bri began playing netball around age 7 with Wathaurong, and she continues to play now for Belmont Lions in Geelong. She played for the Korin Gamadji Institute's Lagunta Sisters team in a Koori carnival, as well as the Victorian Seven Sisters in a national Indigenous carnival in Queensland.

"I have had so many opportunities and friendships come from it. Netball is about making community connections, friendships and having a fun time with those around me," she said.

Round 11 | Vixens vs Swifts | Wurundjeri Land Round 12 | Vixens vs Firebirds | Turrbal and Yuggara Country

The Melbourne Vixens' 2023 First Nations dress artwork was designed and shared by artist Rebecca Atkinson.

"I am a proud Moiradu woman from the Bangerang Nation from my father's side and Kerrupmara woman from the Gunditjmara Nation from my mother's side. I've enjoyed expressing my identity though creative influences from my upbringing and the surrounding landscapes where my connection of culture is embedded everywhere.

This design has different elements to highlight the themes of fearless, togetherness and resilience which empowers the journey of the Melbourne Vixens to lead in 2023. Fearlessness is portrayed with the inner design from the seven circles which represent the seven players on the court, as they play a hard, competitive game to gain a win. The other design attached to the circles is the players who are not on court but supporting from the sidelines. The design in the centre is a showcase of the different movements in the game, from running into the lead to gain the ball, to defence and trying to stop the play.

Resilience is the colour pink, as everyone has different struggles throughout their lives and it might feel like a rollercoaster ride, but with strong resilience you can make it past any barriers that life may present. This is a deadly example of how the First Nations people know the meaning of resilience – the obstacles facing different generations has shaped who we are in today's world.

Togetherness is symbolised in the large outer circles which represent the coaches, staff and supporters of the Melbourne Vixens. There are different layers of who is involved at the club, but everyone is important to make the Melbourne Vixens be successful on the court and off the court. You must have fearlessness, togetherness and resilience to play a hard competitive game of netball in the Suncorp Super Netball season to make the ultimate sacrifice, to make the finals and win."

Round 7 | Fever vs Vixens | Whadjuk Noongar Land Round 13 | Vixens vs Fever | Wurundjeri Land

The Melbourne Vixens' 2024 First Nations dress was designed by proud Kamilaroi woman and artist Teagan Malcolm, who lives and paints on Wurundjeri Country.

Through a collaborative process in consultation with the Vixens' athletes and coaches, the club sought a design based on the theme 'foundations'; a reflection of our connections on Wurundjeri Country.

"I'm Teagan – a proud Kamilaroi woman, illustrator, and artist. Ten years ago, I first moved to Melbourne. I'm honoured to have been welcomed so warmly into the community and am proud to call Wurundjeri Country home.

My work is a collaboration between traditional Aboriginal storytelling practices and modern graphic design and illustration techniques. Each piece is a reflection of contemporary families, communities and experiences. I hope that by capturing these stories through my art, I may preserve them for many generations.

For me, art is more than a personal joy - it's a crucial component in the revitalisation and

preservation of our culture, our language, and our stories.

I initiated the process by mapping out the foundational places of the Vixens, Netball Victoria, and John Cain Arena. I aimed to highlight the connection these locations have to the Wurundjeri and Boonwurrung lands on which they stand. I achieved this by incorporating the shapes of the surrounding parklands into the design.

Additionally, you'll notice the Yarra/Birrarung river winding through the piece. John Cain Arena and Netball Victoria stand side by side in this artwork, symbolising their interconnectedness. They are bound together by the love, passion, and dedication of the Vixens' fans.

When I began reflecting on the 2024 theme of foundations, it was important for me to not only represent the physical spaces used by the Vixens but also to acknowledge what brings those spaces to life – people.

In the top left corner, you'll find seven players, each representing a position on the court. In

the opposite corner, the wider Vixens team is depicted, everyone who works tirelessly to keep the season running. The 'U' shape is used to symbolise people, as they are the shapes left behind in the sand after sitting and storytelling. In this piece, you can see Vixens fans, far and wide, represented by this symbol.

Many other elements of the artwork have been carefully chosen to symbolise joy and celebration, serving as a blessing for the team for a wonderful 2024 season."

'Steadfast' Diamond Artwork

Designed by Samantha Richards

Melbourne Vixens Dress 2023-2024

Titled 'Steadfast' and inspired by the Vixens' values of fearlessness, togetherness and resilience, this piece of art has featured on the Melbourne Vixens' home and away dresses since the 2023 Suncorp Super Netball season.


The artwork was designed by Samantha Richards, a Wurundjeri / Dja Dja Wurrung woman from the Melbourne and Bendigo regions respectively. Samantha creates digital, canvas and mural artworks utilising traditional symbols and contemporary styles to share culture visually in the public space.

"Sharing culture is something I am very passionate about, as it is important to learn about the people that lived on this land in the past, and the people that live here today," she said.

'Steadfast' uses a layering of traditional Wurundjeri symbols to depict the strength of a team, combining to tell the story of the elements involved in building up from where the Vixens began, to where they are now and who they will be in the future. Supported by

the protection (diamonds), strength (double circles) and knowledge (single circle) of their teammates and past players, the Vixens team and the people that have travelled with them along the journey (wavy line with dots) have worked to become what the team is today.

The river in the background represents the flow of change and the ability to adapt (river) and the mountains show that the team has each other's backs (mountains back-to-back). These two elements also represent the landscape of Melbourne and the connection the Vixens have to it. From teamwork, moving forward with the support of fans and building each other up with the different strengths and knowledge of each team member, 'Steadfast' represents these key building blocks in creating a successful team.



Gabby Coffey's Story

Gabby Coffey, a proud Wiradjuri woman hailing from Alice Springs, moved to Melbourne in pursuit of her netball career in 2017. Her scholarship at Caulfield Grammar School marked the beginning of her journey to high performance, which she fully embraced despite the challenges of being away from her family.

While rising through the ranks of Melbourne University Lightning's Victorian Netball League teams, Gabby took every opportunity she could, representing Victoria and the Northern Territory at the Australian Netball Championships and National Netball Championships respectively.

Gabby signed as a training partner with the Melbourne Vixens in 2021, marking her inaugural Suncorp Super Netball contract. In 2022 she made her SSN debut for the Collingwood Magpies against GIANTS Netball, operating under the League's COVID-19 Contingency Framework, and she then made her Melbourne Vixens debut as a temporary replacement player in Round 1, 2023 against West Coast Fever in Perth.

Having reflected on her journey thus far, she highlights the need for enhanced support, particularly for those from regional areas who are looking to enter the pathway.

Her own relocation from Alice Springs to Melbourne resonates in her advocacy for improved pathways and support networks for future athletes.

"It was really tough. Now that I've gotten a bit older, I hope that with my knowledge and experience of it, we can improve that pathway and build a better support network," she said.

Gabby envisages mentorship opportunities for seasoned athletes to guide newcomers, enhancing their adaptation and easing their transition into this competitive arena.

Her journey speaks not only of personal success but also echoes the aspirations to facilitate more accessible pathways for aspiring Aboriginal athletes in netball.

The First Nations Netball Coordinator is responsible for connecting First Nations people to the sport of netball throughout Victoria.

The First Nations Netball Coordinator's primary responsibility is to work with a range of stakeholders to help facilitate greater connection and participation opportunities. The role's purpose is to further develop an inclusive community netball culture, using Netball Victoria's strategic plan and key measures to help develop a framework of netball programs, education, training and support to Netball Victoria's affiliates and First Nations people.

The overall aim is to increase netball participation for First Nations people through new and existing programs and initiatives.

First Nations Advisory Group

Seeing positive outcomes from our First Nations Pathways Working Group, we have recognised the need for advice and support throughout the whole organisation. This will allow us to plan First Nations initiatives and programs with the First Nations netball community.


